Overview

In 2018, UK law was changed so that the weight limit for Cat B driving licence holders driving alternatively fuelled vehicles could be increased from 3.5 tonnes to 4.25 tonnes. This increase in the maximum authorised mass is to offset the loss of payload capacity due to the weight of the batteries.

This course is aimed at businesses looking to reduce their carbon footprint and transition their fleet to alternative fuel such as electric, hydrogen, natural gas or biogas.

Training can only be delivered by a registered trainer on the National Register of LGV Instructors (NRI) or National Vocational Driving Instructor Register (NVDIR).

On completion drivers will receive an official certificate as evidence that they can legally drive an AFV up to 4.25 tonnes and undergo additional training on road, over and above the mandatory 5 hours.

Drivers must complete 5 hours of specific workshop training, as defined by in the Department for Transport guidance document details of which can be found by scanning this QR code.



At the end of the workshop drivers will have:



Be able to legally drive an AFV <4.5t on a Cat B licence



The knowledge how to refuel an AFV and the safety implications of driving one



An improved awareness in how to get the very best out of an AFV in terms of range and performance



An understanding of why it is so important that AFV's exist and how they play a part in the reduction of air pollution



An enhanced understanding of the limitations of each type of fuel and how they can adopt a driving style to suit each one, especially with regards vulnerable road users



A greater understanding of the various forms of electric, hybrid and alternative fuel vehicles



An enhanced understanding of the change in legislation and any impact on drivers hours recording

Delivery method

The workshop will be delivered by a registered trainer with the NRI or the NVDIR, who will fully engage with the participants to maximise the learning experience. Drivers will be facilitated through the learning and attain the knowledge required to attain their certificate.

Our AFV Workshop is available in our virtual classroom live format or in a face-to-face classroom format, allowing for maximum flexibility in terms of participant location and running time.

On road training and vehicle familiarization can be included as an additional programme, typically one hour per driver, scheduled for another date. This additional training is recommended and should be discussed at workshop booking.

- The AFV they drive has a maximum authorised mass of more than 3.5t and less than 4.25t
- Not pulling a trailer
- The driving is for transportation of goods
- Exemption from holding an operator licence
- EC drivers' hours apply to vehicles/vehicle & trailer combination which do not exceed 4.25t. This applies when:
- Used to carry goods
- Their fuel is natural or liquefied gas or electricity
- Drivers are within 100km radius from their base, therefore exempt from using a tacho
- GB domestic rules drivers' hours'
